The 2003 Legislature authorized the facility and designated Wolf Point as the location. But fundraising and organizational development stalled, so the 2011 Legislature revised the law to allow statewide competition.

The 2007 Legislature appropriated \$500,000 for the project, of which about \$75,000 has been spent on a master plan and site development. Private donations pay salaries of the threeperson staff and will pay for the center's construction Economic and operation.
